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STUDENT CONTRACT

All students of the William Spyropoulos School are expected to:

1. attend school regularly and on time.
2. be prepared for class with appropriate materials and properly maintain textbooks and other school equipment.
3. follow school regulations regarding entering and leaving classrooms and the school building. Students are expected to behave in a safe and orderly fashion whenever on school property.
4. behave in a manner that contributes to a safe learning environment and that does not violate the rights of others to learn.
5. share information with school officials regarding matters which may endanger the health and welfare of the members of the school community.
6. respect the dignity and equality of others and refrain from conduct which denies or impinges on the rights of others.
7. be polite, courteous and respectful to all.
8. show respect for school and church property and respect the property of others.
9. set a good example by being kind and inclusive of others.
10. use non-confrontational methods to resolve conflicts.
11. avoid obscene and defamatory communication in speech, writing and other modes of expression when interacting with others.
12. bring to school only those personal possessions that are safe and do not interfere with the learning environment. Adhere to the rules of cell phone use.
13. adhere to the guidelines established for dress code.
14. demonstrate exemplary conduct that follows our Greek Orthodox values at all times.
15. be committed to academic work with honesty and integrity.

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DISCIPLINE SYSTEM

I. DEMERIT AND DETENTION

1. Infractions

- Failing to wear the required school uniform
- Being late to class without permission
- Bringing inappropriate items to school including electronic devices or whatever else the Administration considers as interfering with the school
- Disrupting a lesson (talking, calling out, etc.)
- Engaging in disruptive behavior while on school property (Church, hallways, cafeteria, playground, etc.)
- Engaging in disruptive behavior during a fire drill

2. Consequence

- 3 demerits will result in an after school detention
- Detention will be 45 minutes long from 3:00 - 3:45 P.M. on a designated day. Parents will be notified the day before a detention has to be served. The parent will have to pick up the child at 3:45 P.M.

SPECIAL ATTENTION

The use of cell phones is prohibited during school hours. If the child needs to call home, he/she has to ask permission from the teacher to come to the office and call from the school office phone. Cell phones used by students during the school day will be confiscated and sent to Principal's office and returned only to parents.

II. REFERRAL

1. Infractions

- Using profane, obscene, vulgar or abusive language or gestures
- Lying or giving false information to school personnel
- Misusing property belonging to others
- Engaging in or causing disruptive behavior on the school bus
- Being insubordinate; defying or disobeying the school personnel or school safety agent
- Posting on social media, texting, or distributing libelous or defamatory material or literature on and off school grounds
- Engaging in scholastic dishonesty which includes but is not limited to cheating

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2. Consequence

- Referral sent home for parental advisement and signature
- Parent, teacher and administration conference will be mandated after second referral
- Three referrals will result in a suspension

III. SUSPENSION

1. Infractions

- Leaving class or school premises without permission of supervising school personnel
- Fighting/engaging in physically aggressive behavior
- Tampering with, changing or altering a school record or document
- Falsely activating a fire alarm
- Cutting class
- Posting on social media, texting, or distributing literature or material containing a threat of violence, injury or harm on and off school grounds
- Engaging in sexual suggestive comments, innuendoes, propositions or other verbal or non-verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature including use of internet in school for such conduct
- Engaging in theft or knowingly possessing property belonging to another without authorization
- Threatening violence, injury or harm to another or others
- Engaging in intimidation, coercion or extortion
- Engaging in or causing disruptive behavior on the school bus which creates a substantial risk of or results in injury
- Engaging in vandalism of or graffiti on school/Church property
- Engaging in continued intimidating and bullying behavior
- Engaging in dangerous or violent behavior
- Participating in an incident of group violence
- Engaging in behavior which creates a substantial risk of or results in injury

2. Consequences

- After first suspension there will be a meeting with parents, teachers and administration
- After second suspension, meeting with parents, priest, principal and school board president is required
- Three suspensions may result in expulsion

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The Administration reserves the right to make determination in regards to trips, including the senior trip. A student's behavior may be the reason for the student to be denied the right to participate in a class trip or other school events.

The administration reserves the right to make a determination as to whether any other infraction, not listed above, interferes with the mission of the school and, therefore, warrants an appropriate consequence.

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UNIFORM CODE

Our students must wear the appropriate uniform to school every day. When they attend assemblies and liturgies in Church, students must wear their complete school uniform, which includes wearing the school blazer. Gym uniforms and sneakers are to be worn only on gym days. Boots are allowed only on rainy/snowy days.

ABSENCES & LATENESS

Students are discouraged from being absent, unless they are ill or have other serious personal/family reasons. Frequent absences can have a negative effect on a student's academic performance. In order for an absence of more than two days to be excused, a doctor's note is required.

Students should not be late to school in the morning. All latenesses are recorded, and frequent latenesses can have a negative effect on a student's academic performance. Students are considered late if they do not report to homeroom for attendance by the 8:40AM bell.

7th GRADE ARISTA

To be invited to the Arista Induction Ceremony, a seventh grader must achieve a Principal's Award with Honors at the end of seventh grade.

8th GRADE ARISTA

To receive an Arista pin at Awards Night, eighth graders must achieve the following:

- Qualify for at least a Principal's Award
- Receive a final overall average of G or better in behavior
- Receive a final overall average of S or better on all minor subjects
- Complete ten hours of documented service within the school (subject to approval.) Examples of service hours include being monitors, peer tutors, members of a school team etc.

VALEDICTORIAN AND SALUTATORIAN TITLES

The Valedictorian and Salutatorian titles are determined by the overall final average the students receive in the seven major subject areas (English, Social Studies, Math, Science, Religion, Greek and Spanish) in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. In order for a student to become a Valedictorian or Salutatorian, the student must be in Accelerated Math and Science and Honors Greek classes in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. He/she must also have excellent behavior in Junior High School and service hours in the eighth grade.

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
